





Whitelow 3 This week we have really enjoyed lots of imaginative play, pretending to have tea parties and pretending to be chefs on pancake day! We were very excited to have a "pancake flipping" competition and go on a



pancake hunt. We have also enjoyed some Maths/Art week activities, making lovely patterns with different colours and frozen paint balloons.

Whitelow 4 have been busy this week, enjoying the Art/Maths week. We have been learning about different artists and taking part in lots of activities! We explored colourful sensory tiles and we used blocks to make different structures. We used painting sticks to paint in the style of Picasso. We also explored different 3D shapes and we made a beautiful picture using line patterns.



Whitelow 5 It has been Maths/Art week this week in school and the children in Whitelow 5 have loved engaging with the fantastic hands on experiences linked to the different artists. We particularly enjoyed learning about Wassily Kandinsky and made circle patterns with paint in the style of his work. The finished pieces of work were masterpieces, fit to adorn the walls of any museum.



Redvales 1 have really enjoyed Maths /Art week! We have done some lovely line patterns and a class picture of a fish (like Picasso). We also en-



joyed learning about shape and colour, and learned about lots of different artists. Outside of maths week we enjoyed our sensory story with Twinkleboost.

Redvales 2 We have had a lovely week doing lots of Maths and Art activities. We explored 3 D shape sculptures, Islamic Art, Line Patterns and Picasso. Also in Maths we have been exploring how many eggs fit into an egg box linked to our story



"Jack and the Beanstalk" and building a giant beanstalk using blocks.



Redvales 3 have really enjoyed Maths and Art week this week! We have looked at the work of Klee, Kandinsky and Picasso in Art. In Maths we have been measuring the diameter of circles for our art work and using

shapes to make geometric patterns. We have been busy rehearsing for our Opera performance in Music and have been recording the growth of our sunflowers in Science.



Redvales 4 This week we have been looking at artists who use shapes in their work. We made pictures using 2D shapes like Robert Delauney, circle pictures like Wassilly Kandinsky, we put together a cut up photo of ourselves in different



coloured tints like Paul Klee. We made a class picture in the style of Picasso and made 3D sculptures. While we have been doing all this we have also learnt about the properties of the shapes we have been using. In music we guessed which instruments were playing before we could see them and then played our own instruments to different styles of background music. In English

we have been looking at handwriting families ie ladder letters which start with a downward stroke; I, i, t, u, j and y, curly caterpillar letters which start with a curl to the left; c, a, o, d, g, q, e, s, f.



Redvales 5 have had wonderful Maths and Art Week. We have loved exploring how 2D and 3D shapes are used in different pieces of Art. Redvales 5 enjoyed recreating Robert Delaunay art work whilst listening to classical music.

Art week! We engaged in a range of activities such as building 3D sculptures and creating line using patterns paint and masktape. We





PROGRESS REPORT FROM PROJECT MANAGER

Millwood School- Progress Report No7

1.0 Progress Report

I.I Progress to Date

The project commenced on 7^{th} January 2019 and is forecast to complete within a 26 week contract period.

Since the previous report No 6 (26/2/19), the contractor has undertaken the following activities:

- I. Foundations have been completed to both classrooms including the new assistant head office.
- 2. Roof structure to the infill classroom.

1.2 Progress against Programme

To date the contractor is on programme with their construction activities.

- Piling has been completed.
- Ground beams and floor slab are complete to both classrooms and the new assistant head
 office.
- Drainage within the floor slab areas of the extension classroom have been completed.
- The wall in the corridor outside the 'infill' classroom has been completed on the corridor side.

3.0 Project Issues

- 1. The School have reviewed the use of the existing WC room reallocated to the infill classroom and decided that the toilet will not be relocated within the room. This has the effect that the Laundry room will not be subject to works during the Spring break. The WC facility has closed for use by the school from 4th March 2019.
- 2. Bury MBC and the school have requested an alternative Hoist supplier be approached and this is currently being explored. A meeting has been held on 15th February 2019 with a supplier. GN Healthcare & Chameleon Care approached so far. GN Healthcare



- attended a second meeting with the School on Ist March 2019 and agreed on the specification of the hoists which will be an upgrade on the existing hoists.
- The extent of fixed furniture is under discussion between Pick Everard and the School.
 TS Booker are preparing a drawn and costed solution over the next few weeks for review.
- 4. The existing glazed screen to the courtyard will be reused as the outer wall of the new infill classroom and the door position adjusted to suit the classroom operation.

4.0 Social Value

The integration between the project and social value matters is being discussed between the contractor and the school. A number of subjects are being discussed in the hope that several opportunities can be incorporated into the project.

The following activities have been completed to date:

- 1. Ground Breaking Ceremony successfully took place on 5th February.
- 2. School pupil/Staff presentation by HH Smith successfully took place on 1st March.

The following future activities are in discussion:

I. Artwork competition.

HH Smith have appointed Diane Whitfield and Chris Purkiss to deal with Social Value matters.

5.0 Environmental

- 1. Materials and equipment from the courtyard are being retained for reuse elsewhere in the school.
- 2. The contractors site compound has been laid out to retain existing trees and avoid any removal.
- 3. The proposed design will use the existing grey water collection system.

6.0 Works planned over next Four weeks

During the next four weeks, for the period upto the mid-term spring holiday, the following activities are planned to both the infill and extension classrooms:

- Completion of the Steel frame superstructure installation.
- External walls and roof commencement and continuation.
- Internal drain laying to the corridor outside the infill classroom.

The following designs will continue:

- Architectural (preliminary issued 15th February 2019 and further revisions issued 22nd February 2019).
- Mechanical & Electrical Services including heating, sprinklers, security systems etc.

The following designs are complete:

- Structural foundation design (issued 1st February 2019).
- Steel frame (issued 21st February 2019).



It's important to note that new challenges are arising on the internet all the time. We have created to this guide to raise awareness of the issue and offer advice on helping parents to talk to their children about making safer decisions online. See also our 7 conversation starters' guide for more tips on better communication with your child.

> Momo is a sinister 'challenge' that has been around for some time. It has recently resurfaced and once again has come to the attention of schools and children across the country. Dubbed the 'suicide killer game', Momo has been heavily linked with apps such as Facebook, WhatsApp, YouTube, and most recently (and most worryingly)... YouTube Kids. The scary doll-like figure reportedly sends graphic violent images, and asks users to partake in dangerous challenges like waking up at random hours and has even been associated with self-harm. It has been reported that the 'Momo' figure was originally created as a sculpture and featured in an art gallery in Tokyo and unrelated to the 'Momo' challenge we are hearing about in the media.

What parents need to know about

There have been recent reports that some There have been recent reports that some seemingly innocent videos on YouTube and YouTube Kids (such as 'surprise eggs', unboxing videos and Minecraft videos) have been edited by unknown sources to include violence provoking and/or other inappropriate content. Even though YouTube monitor and remove videos that include inappropriate content, clips can be uploaded and viewed thousands of times before they get reported and removed. As a parent, it's difficult to spot these videos as the harmful content doesn't appear until the harmful content doesn't appear until partway through the video.

Popular YouTubers and other accounts have been uploading reaction videos, showing their experience of the MOMO challenge. Some of the videos include a disclosure message warning that the content may be "inappropriate or offensive to some audiences" and that "viewer discretion is advised" but these videos are still easily accessed by clicking 'I understand and wish to proceed'. The image of the 'Momo' character can be deeply distressing to children and young people and it's important to note that it may slip through parental settings and filters. Popular YouTubers and other accounts have

SUGGESTED VIDEOS ON YOUTUBE

Video apps such as YouTube include an 'up next' feature which automatically starts playing another video based on the video just watched. Due to YouTube's algorithm, users are shown 'suggested videos' that they may be interested in. The thumbnails used on suggested videos are purposefully created in a way to encourage viewers to click them. During our research, we found that when watching one Momo related video, we were shown countless other Momo themed videos and other scary content which would be age-inappropriate. Video apps such as YouTube include an 'up content which would be age-inappropriate for children under 18.



Top Tips for Parents

TELL THEM IT'S NOT REAL

Just like any urban legend or horror story, the concept can be quite frightening and distressing for young people. Whilst this may seem obvious, it's important for you to reiterate to your child that Momo is not a real person and cannot directly harm them! Also, tell your child to not go openly searching for this content online as it may only cause more distress.

BE PRESENT

It's important for you, as a parent or carer, to be present while your children are online. This will give you a greater understanding of what they are doing on their devices, as well as providing you with the opportunity to discuss, support and stop certain activities that your child may be involved in. As the nature of each task become progressively worse it's also important to recognise any changes in your child's behaviour.

TALK REGULARLY WITH

As well as monitoring your child's activity, it's important for you discuss it with them too. Not only will this give you an understanding of their online actions, but those honest and frequent conversations will encourage your child to feel confident to discuss issues and concerns they may have related to the online world.

DEVICE SETTINGS & PARENTAL CONTROLS

Ensure that you set up parental controls for your devices at home. This will help to restrict the types of content that your child can view. as well as help you to monitor their activity. In addition to this, it's vital that you are aware of your device and account settings to ensure your child's utmost safety. For example, on YouTube you can turn off 'suggested auto-play' on videos to stop your child from viewing contentthat they have not directly selected.

Trends and viral challenges can be tempting for children to take part in; no matter how dangerous or scary they seem. Make sure you talk to your child about how they shouldn't succomb to peer pressure and do anything they are not comfortable with, anlie or offline. If they are unsure, encourage them to talk to you or another trusted adult.

REAL OR HOAX?

As a parent it is natural to feel worried about certain things you see online that may be harmful to your child. However, not everthing you see online istrue. Check the validity of the source and be mindful of what you share as it may only cause more worry.

REPORT & BLOCK

You can't always rely on parental controls to block distressing or harmful material. People find ways around a platform's algorithm in order to share and promote this type of material. Due to this, we advise that you flag and report any material you deem to be inappropriate or harmful as soon as you come across it. You should also block the account/content to prevent your child from viewing it. Also encourage your child to record/screenshot any content they feel could be malicious to provide evidence in order to escalate the issue to the appropriate channels.

FURTHER SUPPORT

Speak to the safeguarding lead within your child's school should you have any concerns regarding your child's online activity or malicious content that could affect them.

If your child sees something distressing, it is important that they know where to go to seek help and who their trusted adults are. They could also contact Childline where a trained counsellor will listen to anything that's worrying them.
